RABBI'S MESSAGE

A ROLLER COASTER YEAR

2017 is now in the past, and 2018 is our future. In the Houston area, it's hard to imagine a more emotional year than 2017. In fact, it's hard to even remember anything that happened prior to Hurricane Harvey flooding the city. There are those in our community who are still not in their own homes. Many have had to make major adjustments in their lives.

This hurricane affected the entire community, whether your personal home was damaged or not. I was at a service recently which closed with personal expressions of gratitude. One person said, "I am grateful that my house did not flood, and I am in my own home." Another said, "I am grateful that I will be able to go back to my house at the end of December and wake up in my own home January 1; I am also grateful that I have been able to spend time with my grandchildren while I was displaced."

It isn't easy to express gratitude when dealing with tragedy. And yet, the mood in the city, rather than despair, was one of hopefulness. Despite the constant reminders of debris on the streets, there seemed to be an attitude that said, "We'll get through this together." Neighbors and strangers helping each other, crowded homes or downsized apartments or hotel rooms, hopefully letting those who had suffered the most damage know, "you are not alone."

At these times, I am reminded of lessons from the Book of Job. When Job's life was going splendidly, he praised G-d; when he lost everything, he praised G-d. But his friends tried to lay the blame on Job himself. They suggested that his misfortune must have been a punishment for some unknown misdeeds or moral failings. Rather than be supportive of a friend in need, they accused him of bringing on his own troubles. And Job, through deep introspection, said, "G-d gives; G-d takes away. Blessed be the name of G-d."

Whether it is a hurricane, ill health, unemployment or other stresses, nobody asks to be a victim. These are the times when we can be most supportive of each other, knowing that any of us can suffer an unexpected tragedy. When there is a community to help out, with both practical needs and emotional encouragement, we can face anything together.

And then...the Astros won the World Series! Without diminishing anyone's personal difficulties, the Astros brought a special joy to Houston. Even those who have never cared about baseball in the past got caught up in the feeling of accomplishment. These young men said, "We can do it!" And they did! They took a city that was still looking at soggy drywall and furniture on the streets, and infused a sense of hopefulness that is difficult to compare. A baseball victory doesn't change our lives, but it helped us conclude 2017 feeling pretty good about our community.

Many Temple Beth Torah members support FamilyTime with donations and by volunteering at the shelter.

Scholarships for Camp

The Jewish Federation of Greater Houston is once again offering grants and scholarships for children seeking to attend overnight camp or to participate in trips to Israel. For all local Jewish children, the Federation provides two forms of need-based scholarships for overnight camp and Israel experiences: general financial assistance, and scholarships for campers whose families were affected by Hurricane Harvey. For families whose children are not currently enrolled in a daily Jewish educational program (such as a Jewish day school), the Federation's One Happy Camper program offers \$1,000 incentive grants that are not need-based for first-time campers attending for 19 or more consecutive days, and \$700 grants for first-time campers attending for 12-18 consecutive days. Torah Portions for January 2018 *Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon*

Shemot Exodus 1:1-6:1 January 5-6, 2018

The sons of Israel and their families have settled in Egypt, but a new king arises who did not honor the relationship Joseph had established. Because of Pharaoh's fear of a revolt, male Hebrew babies are ordered to be killed. With the help of conspiring midwives, Shifra and Puah, Moses' mother saves him by putting him in a basket where he is later found by Pharaoh's daughter and adopted. Moses kills an Egyptian taskmaster and flees to Midian. He marries, and while watching his father-in-law's sheep, G-d appears to Moses out of a burning bush that is not consumed. G-d reveals His plan to free the Israelites, and sends Moses and his brother Aaron to speak to Pharaoh about freeing the Hebrew slaves.

Va-eira Exodus 6:2-9:35 January 12-13, 2018

G-d reveals His sacred name to Moses, and tells him that he is the first one to know it. G-d assures Moses that He will be with him as he negotiates with Pharaoh. The plagues begin: blood, frogs, vermin, locusts, cattle disease, boils and hail; but each time, Pharaoh's heart is hard, and he does not free the Hebrew slaves.

Bo, Exodus 10:1-13:16 January 19-20, 2018

The plagues continue with Pharaoh's lack of response predictable, as G-d reveals to Moses, "*I am hardening Pharaoh's heart in order to increase My wonders - so you will tell your children and grandchildren how I toyed with Egypt, and the wonders I put in them. And they shall know that I am God.*" (Exodus 10:1-2) For years, scholars and commentators wonder why ten plagues were necessary. The Torah suggests that the plagues had to be memorable enough for us to continue to retell the story. The Israelites receive instructions to place blood above our doorposts as a sign for the angel of death to "pass over" our homes, and the Torah reveals laws about how to remember Pesach/Passover in the future.

Beshalach Exodus 13:17-17:16 January 26-27, 2018

Finally set free by the Pharaoh, the Israelites depart from Egypt, only to be pursued by a Pharaoh who changed his mind about their freedom. God instructs Moses to lift his staff, and the Sea of Reeds parts for the Israelites to walk through on dry land. When Moses and the Israelites see the Egyptians drown in the Reed Sea, they sing a song of praise to God. Bitter reality of their journey causes them to complain to Moses their leader. In response, God sends manna to appease their hunger.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.

Temple Beth Torah Donate a Brick Campaign

TBT member Will Pollard has built a brick path in front of our Sukkah as part of his Eagle Scout project. We are now giving everyone an opportunity to donate an engraved brick for the path with **all donations going to support Temple Beth Torah!**

This is a wonderful way to remember a loved one or honor a friend/family member. You can also use it to commemorate an occasion, like a bar/bat mitzvah, a wedding, an anniversary or a memorable birthday.

Each brick can be inscribed with 3 lines and 20 characters per line (letters, numbers, spaces, punctuation and other keyboard symbols are considered characters).

Various approved clip art designs can be made available for an additional \$20 donation per brick. If clip art is used, the text is limited to 15 characters per line.
