Tu B'Shevat is considered the New Year of Trees; sort of a Jewish Arbor Day. Tu B'Shevat is a holiday mentioned in the Mishnah, and a seder on this holiday has become re-vitalized in modern times. We will blend our Shabbat observance with a tasting of traditional foods that are mentioned in the Torah and are grown in Israel. We will enjoy music and stories that honor our appreciation of trees. Rabbi Dan and Cantor Vadim will present a unique celebration, and we will enjoy a delicious Shabbat dinner. RABBI'S MESSAGE

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Moses and Martin

A few weeks ago, I had the opportunity to join the *Houston Jewish Alliance for Civil Rights* at the annual Martin Luther King Jr. Day Parade. The Jewish group was small in comparison to some of the schools and other organizations, and we represented a diverse group of Jewish clergy, community leaders, adults and children from several different synagogues and organizations. In marching for human rights, we joined a longstanding Jewish tradition, as one participant wore a t-shirt that said, "Fighting Tyrants Since Pharaoh." I was reminded of the many similarities between Martin Luther King, Jr. and the biblical hero, Moses.

The similarities have just as much to do with their shortcomings as with their leadership. Both men have come to symbolize the ultimate in leadership, and neither would have anticipated this role. Both came from humble beginnings, and both took on their leadership roles reluctantly. Civil rights leaders knew they needed a charismatic young voice to inspire the African American community to stand up for their own rights. A protest march was planned to go right by Dr. King's church, and when he saw the passionate marchers, he felt drawn to the movement. Moses found a heavenly voice that spoke to him from a burning bush as he chased after a lost sheep. He insisted that he was not the one to lead the Hebrews from slavery and pointed to his speech difficulties as a reason for G-d to look elsewhere. G-d countered by telling Moses that he would not have to act alone, but that his brother Aaron would help with the speaking and G-d himself would provide support. Both men needed to learn that they could not achieve such lofty goals without help from others. Despite their humility, both spoke truth to power, Moses with his demands to Pharaoh and King to political leaders of the south. Moses and Martin both helped their people move forward toward real progress, but neither lived to see the "Promised Land." As Moses looked over the Jordan River, he knew he had led his people as far as possible and they would have to go on without him. King's premonition on the night before his death was very reminiscent of Moses: "Well I don't know what will happen...but it really doesn't matter to me now, because I've been to the mountaintop. Like anyone, I would like to live a long life...but I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And He's allowed me to go up to the mountain. I've looked over and I've seen the Promised Land. I may not get there with you, but I want you to know that we, as a people, will get to the Promised Land...Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the LORD."

A Jewish alliance in a parade to honor Dr. King's legacy is in perfect keeping with Jewish tradition. Our march across the desert took forty years. But the march continues as long as oppression exists against any people because of race, ethnicity, religion, gender, age or sexual identification. For some, the Jewish focus has been, "We have to look out for ourselves because nobody else will." I prefer to look at the teachings of Rabbi Hillel, who says, "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? And if I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when?"

Dr. King was famously joined by Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel in Selma, Alabama. Rabbi Heschel was asked why a Jewish rabbi, born in Poland, educated in Germany and who teaches rabbis at a Jewish seminary would interrupt his busy life to march in Alabama for the rights of African American who were not even Jewish. Rabbi Heschel said, "I am praying with my feet."

The march continues, progressing toward a "Promised Land" that is free from all oppression. We can all do our part.

THE COOLEST FUNDRAISER! HELP TBT GET A MUCH-NEEDED NEW AIR CONDITIONER

We've been lucky for several years at Temple Beth Torah. Seven years ago, we remodeled the social hall and sanctuary, added new classrooms, and created a kitchen and rest rooms that are comfortable, functional and beautiful. Our building is a comfortable place for worship, learning and fellowship. And now is YOUR chance to help keep it comfortable!

Due to a series of electrical issues over the last two years, it has become time to replace the air conditioning/heating system in the sanctuary. This is a major expense for our small pool of members. We need to raise \$15,000 quickly, and YOU can help. A couple of kind donors have already stepped up to start the process, but we are still far from filling the need. Small and large donations are welcome. years to come.

MAKING TBT FUN AND SAFE

Many thanks to Wes Goble and the Building Committee who worked tirelessly to make our playground safer for the children. They **replaced 7 foundation stumps** that hold up the playground play gym to make it much more stable. These new stumps should keep the **play gym strong and stable for many years** to come. The gym bridge also needed to be replaced, so the team built a whole new bridge. The **new bridge looks great and is safe and strong**.

Many kind donors stepped up to help fund these repairs, and the hard labor and physical hours from the Building Committee team helped save in the labor costs. We had a very successful funding drive at the beginning of the year, but completing the job required the purchase of more mulch than originally anticipated. The investment of this mulch, which is safer and longer lasting, means that we don't have to undergo the labor and expense every few years; in fact, instead of replacing the mulch every two years, this project is expected to last **FIFTY YEARS!** Anyone who would like to help sponsor this project can contact Wes or Jeremy. "Many hands can make the work light." If you're willing to lend some time, we can find a job that fits your skills and interest.

Also, many thanks to Roger Zevallos and his sons, Matthew and Joshua, who spent eight hours moving the heavy bags to the playground, **10,000 pounds** worth. Spreading the mulch was also a team effort. Thanks to the hard work of Roger Zevallos, Jeff Kaufman, Wes Goble, Manny Miller, Owen Brawn, Caleb Brawn, and Andrew Shuman, who cut open 250 bags and helped spread the rubber mulch onto the playground. Now the playground looks terrific, and more importantly, has a safe, soft, cushiony feel to it.

Many people in the Jewish community of Houston and surrounding areas were sad to see Belden's grocery store close. Belden's was the "go to" place for many to get kosher food and Passover products. Randall's in Meyer Park and Kroger's on South Post Oak still have a good selection, and management of the new HEB in Meyerland Plaza near Bellaire is promising a very wide selection of kosher products. Sharing covered parking with JCPenney, it's convenient and easy to access. For those driving from Kingwood, it is just off the Beechnut exit of 610. The store is open 6 a.m. to 12 a.m. The location's manager, Hugh Sintic explains, the "95,000-squarefoot store will offer traditional H-E-B offerings, in addition to a slew of kosher offerings, including a dedicated bakery, butcher, sandwiches, and coffee shop, plus sections stocked with kosher frozen food, seafood and dairy products." This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.

Torah Portions for February 2020

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

Beshalach Exodus 13:17-17:16 February 7-8, 2020

Finally set free by the Pharaoh, the Israelites depart from Egypt, only to be pursued by the ambivalent Pharaoh. God instructs Moses to lift his staff, and the Sea of Reeds parts for the Israelites to walk through on dry land. When Moses and the Israelites see the Egyptians drown in the Reed Sea, they sing a song of praise to God. Bitter reality of their journey causes them to complain to Moses their leader. In response, God sends manna to appease their hunger.

<u>Yitro Exodus 18:1-20:23 February 14-15, 2020</u>

Yitro, the portion named for Moses' father-in-law, begins with the Midianite priest's stunning confession that "the Lord is greater than all gods." Wise Jethro sees that Moses is taking too much on his own shoulders, and counsels his son-in-law to delegate his authority. The Ten Commandments are given by God in Yitro, amidst thunder and lightning, through Moses' voice. These commandments begin our relationship as a people with a special covenant with God that includes special responsibilities. They are not referred to as "Ten Commandments" at this point, and later called in Hebrew "Aseret Dibrot," or "Ten Words/Utterances." How the ten are divided differs between Judaism and Christianity, as well as within some Christian denominations.

Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18 February 21-22, 2020

"Mishpatim" means "rules," "laws" or "ordinances," and seems disorganized to the modern reader because the rules were meant to be remembered through hearing rather than reading. Both ritual and ethical laws are given in Mishpatim. Some of the most important laws concern ethical treatment for the stranger, the widow and the orphan. The first laws given after the Ten Commandments include treatment of slaves. While we were not forbidden to have slaves, we were commanded to treat them in a certain manner, which included offering freedom after seven years. It is a valuable lesson to remember, since we had just come out of slavery. Sometimes, we are expected to do the opposite of the examples of what we've observed from our experiences. In this case, we're expected to treat servants how we would have liked to have been treated, rather than how we were treated.

Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19 February 28-29, 2020

We receive an elaborate description of how the Tabernacle is to be constructed, from the kind of wood used to the fabric for the drapes. Even though the construction is described in very elegant terms, we are encouraged only to make offerings from our hearts. A center piece in the Tabernacle will be the seven-branched menorah, which will be kept lit in an eternal light, signifying God's constant presence.


