RABBI'S MESSAGE

What Happens Next?

When the "big" holidays, the really High Holidays of Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur are over, I am reminded of my younger years in high school and college. At the end of a school year, final exams were looming as well as the due dates for final papers. I would cram, study, lose some sleep, work hard, procrastinate and procrastinate some more. I was nervous and often questioned myself: Had I studied enough? Did I know the material? Did I express myself well on the assignments? How will I be judged? Then, in a matter of a few days, the exams were complete, and the papers were submitted. While waiting for the results, I breathed a sigh of relief. Soon afterwards, I would discover that I did well enough to progress to the next level of learning.

The emotions surrounding High Holidays can be similar. Granted, for a rabbi, the pressure is a little more intense. But the anticipation of a New Year is there for all of us. We focus our energies on these powerful days of worship, asking God to accept our prayers and inscribe us in the metaphorical "Book of Life" for a good year. People may start their emotional preparation for a new year at various times. The Jewish calendar gives us reminders beginning several months before. On Passover, we acknowledge freedom from bondage, and seven weeks later, on Shavuot, we celebrate receiving the Ten Commandments. After Shavuot comes Tisha B'Av, commemorating the date of the destruction of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Each of these is a time of transition and renewal. Jewish life changed when we left Egypt, when received the Torah and when we changed our mode of worship from Temple sacrifices to communal prayer and study. Each of these events helps us think about the concept of starting something new. Every Passover, we have the opportunity to re-explore the concept of freedom. On Shavuot, we renew our commitment to Commandments and on Tisha B'Av we can contemplate how to deal with loss and move on to something new.

When students complete a level of learning, the next step can stimulate both excitement and nervous anticipation. It might be moving on from high school to college, or to a graduate program or to a job. It might even be completing a bar or bat mitzvah and becoming ready to develop into becoming a Jewish adult. We look back on what we've accomplished, and look forward to the mysteries of taking that next step. That is the excitement of a New Year. Whatever went into last year is a springboard for what happens next.

I am finally beginning to learn how endings and beginnings are linked. My graduation from college was a short-lived celebration that began the excitement for my first professional job. When I completed my rabbinic ordination, already several years into my service at Temple Beth Torah, I focused on becoming a better rabbi. A wedding is also a celebration that leads to the ongoing development of a committed relationship. The death of a spouse or a divorce, though hardly a celebration, is also a transition to the next step of life. With each transition, we learn how to move on.

That's probably why Simchat Torah (literally "the joy of learning") comes so soon after Yom Kippur. We've just completed "finals week" – the awesome mission of evaluating the past and preparing for the future. And **then**, we complete one level of Torah learning by reading the last section of Deuteronomy and **immediately** begin the next step by starting over with Genesis. And we call it a "simcha" – a joy. Because transitions, even hard ones, help us learn, grow and become the people we were destined to become.

What happens next? That is a mystery. And we'll learn about it together, helping each other every new step of the way.

Temple Beth Torah In-Person Shabbat Worship Guidelines

Registration Not Required to Attend in-Person Shabbat Worship Starting October 8

Starting October 8th, registration to attend in-person Shabbat worship will not be required for most Friday evening services.

Our attendance protocols have not changed (see below) and all those entering the building will be asked to answer a series of questions regarding their health and possible exposure to COVID-19. We want everyone coming to worship at TBT to be safe.

Please feel free to let us know if you have any questions.

Shabbat In-Person Worship Guidelines:

- 1. As per the CDC recommendations, everyone eligible for vaccination against COVID-19 should be vaccinated.
- 2. Do not come to Temple Beth Torah if you are ill with a communicable disease or if you have had possible or known exposure to COVID-19.
- 3. Everyone in the building must wear a mask except those speaking from the pulpit.
- 4. Distance yourself from others outside your family or friend "pod."\The sanctuary capacity will be limited.
- 5. An usher will be available in the sanctuary to help with seating and answer any questions.
- 6. There will be no food served in the building.

Do you know how many Jewish baseball players have made an impact in America's National Pastime? We have Alex Bregman locally for the Houston Astros, but past Astros included pitcher Norm Miller and catcher Brad Ausmus.



Hall of Famers Hank Greenburg and Sandy Koufax are at the top of the list, and there have also been several Most Valuable Players and Cy Young Award winners, like Al Rosen and Steve Stone. The first ever Designated Hitter was Ron Blomberg (known in NY as Der Boomer), of the Yankees and there have been several Jewish executives and team owners like Theo Epstein and former Commissioner of Baseball, Bud Selig.

Greg Harris, a Chicago attorney, has a passion for Jewish baseball players. He had a dream to create a painting of as many Jewish players as possible. With the support of Major League Baseball, he commissioned artist Ron Lewis to create a 24" by 36" painting, which is on display at Temple Beth Torah for an upcoming presentation and raffle. The painting includes 26 current and former Jewish baseball players along with 9 prominent Jewish figures, including fans like Rob Reiner, Larry King and Billy Crystal. Greg Harris will give an entertaining talk on Zoom especially for TBT on Sunday afternoon, October 3, the last day of the current season. Raffle tickets are \$25 each (or 5 for \$100) to win the painting for yourself, or to give as a gift.

As a special bonus, the winner can personalize the painting, as the artist will paint for the winner a designated person into the crowd behind the players! The value of this unique piece of art is \$1250. The winner can also personalize the nameplate on the painting. Multiple people can be added for an additional fee.

GENERAL FUND

Torah Portions for October 2021

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

October 1-2, 2021 Bereshit, Genesis 1:1-6:8

For our Simchat Torah celebration, we repeat the last lines of Deuteronomy and begin immediately with the first passages in Genesis. Torah is a never-ending learning process, so as soon as we finish, we begin again, searching for new insights. The end of Deuteronomy includes the final blessings that Moses bestows upon the Children of Israel, detailing the end of his life and the transition to new leadership for the new land. The opening chapters of Torah outline G-d's creation of the world day-by-day, and move into the struggles of the human family. These passages include commonly known stories; Adam and Eve eating the forbidden fruit, Cain's murder of his brother, Abel and the Tower of Babel, leading up to the time of Noah. Simchat Torah, coming at the end of Sukkot, highlights the transition from one journey to the next.

October 8-9, 2021 Noah, Genesis 6:9-11:32

Noah's story is also about new beginnings. Noah, having been "righteous in his day" gains G-d's trust, and his family becomes the sole survivors of the Great Flood. The evil world is washed away, and Noah and his family gave the opportunity to rebuild and repopulate. G-d makes everlasting promises to mankind. The rainbow tells us that G-d will never again destroy the world, and Noah's line will lead us to Abraham, with whom G-d will connect the eternal covenants.

October 15-16, 2021 Lech L'Cha, Genesis 12:1-17:27

G-d speaks to Abram for the first time, establishing both blessings and covenants. Abram shows his faith to G-d by leaving his home and following G-d's plan. It is unclear from the Torah why Abram was chosen, but *midrashic* stories hint the Abram had a special connection, believing in one G-d when others worshipped idols. In one popular midrash, young Abraham smashes idols in his father's shop to prove they are not gods. G-d changes his name to Abraham, which means "father of many," and promises that he will be blessed by all nations, and will have a legacy of many offspring.

October 22-23, 2021 Vayeira, Genesis 18:1-22:24

There are many tests in this Torah portion. Visitors come to see Abraham, and he welcomes them with extraordinary hospitality. Sarah and Abraham learn that, despite their advanced years, they will have a son together. Sarah laughs at the possibility, leading to the child being named Isaac ("she will laugh"). G-d consults with Abraham about His plan to destroy Sodom and Gemorrah, and Abraham negotiates a plan to try to save the city. Later, Abraham is tested by being asked by G-d to sacrifice Isaac. Abraham is prepared to make this ultimate sacrifice before an angel of G-d stops him, and a ram is sacrificed instead of his son.

October 29-30, 2021 Chaya Sarah, Genesis 23:1-25:18

Almost immediately after the near-death of her son, Sarah dies at 127 years old. Abraham wants to make sure she has an honorable burial. Though the landowner offers to give him burial land for free, Abraham insists on paying the full price. He then sends his servant, Elazar, to look for a wife for Isaac. Rebecca, a distant cousin, is chosen because her kindness to humans and animals indicates a unique sensitivity that Elazar thinks will be important to become Isaac's bride.

Various approved clip art designs can be made available for an additional \$20 donation per brick. If clip art is used, the text is limited to 15 characters per line.


