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### **RABBI'S MESSAGE**

Crayola in the Sky

I had an experience recently that I don't get very often. I saw the sunrise on a beach. I will say it was not the most beautiful sunrise I had ever seen, but that's kind of like saying that Beethoven's Symphony Number Three was not his best work; it's still quite good! As I walked along the beach, I noticed the variety of hues, some with names I could identify, like pink and gray and blue. Other shades might have been more nuanced: charcoal gray, sky blue, scarlet. It reminded me of a time when I was in Galveston, officiating a man's conversion to Judaism. As part of the conversion and subsequent immersion in the bay for a *mikvah*, we did a *havdallah* service. As the main blessing in *havdallah* praises G-d for separation – separating Shabbat from the rest of the week – *havdallah* prior to conversion was a symbolic representation of the separation of his before his conversion and after he officially took on the obligation of becoming Jewish. I remember seeing the dark sky in the west (midnight blue?) and the bright light in the east (pink and red). Directly above our heads, the night and the day blended together forming a color that I could not identify; kind of gray, mixed with some purple. It felt like this moment of conversion, the blending of the past with the future, was a mysterious haze that could only be answered with time.

I've often looked at the world during dawn or dusk and tried to separate the colors. Of the many colors that exist in nature, most of them I can only recognize from the box of crayons I used as a child. I remember colors like Sierra, eggplant, mauve, powder blue, sky blue, midnight blue, chartreuse, scarlet, burnt orange, etc. These are all just names that were made up by someone – maybe the crayon manufacturers. The standard colors of the rainbow – red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo and violet – all blend to form unique shades. When I look outside and see branches and leaves of trees against a sky whose color changes moment by moment, or when a thunderstorm approaches and finishes, none of the colors seem to fit exactly in a particular category.

People can be like that. The labels we give people can be as vague or as accurate as the colors of nature. We use words like vivacious, friendly and outgoing, but also aggressive, nosy and pushy. Someone might be considered private, humble and unassuming, but to others might appear stand-offish or arrogant. When we say a color is red or blue or green, there is a very wide spectrum, darker and lighter, brighter or dimmer. The Crayola company may believe it can come up with a name for the hue, but there are as many different shades of color as there are different individual people. Perhaps that is why G-d's early promise to humanity, the rainbow, is a multi-colored spectrum. To remind us of the unique individuality of every separate being. The red at the beginning of the rainbow is no more or less important than the violet at the end or the green in the middle.

Look outside your home, and you'll see a beautiful, undefinable array of color. Look inside your soul, and you'll see a beautiful multitude of possibilities and connections.

### Shavuot and Receiving Torah - Special Zoom Program of Storytelling with Rabbi Dan Gordon and friends - June 11 7:45 PM

The holiday of Shavuot is one the Shalosh *Regalim* – the three holidays where in the times of the Temple, the Jewish people made pilgrimages to Jerusalem. Shavuot means "weeks," and it is exactly seven weeks after Passover. The holiday commemorates our people receiving Torah at Mount Sinai, VERY early in the morning, as the story goes.

It is tradition to stay up all night learning Torah, to be ready at dawn for revelation. A few years ago, Loren and I were in Israel on Erev Shavuot, and joined countless people walking to the Western Wall at 4:00 AM to be able to share sunrise and prayer together.

Late night learning activities are popular, and Rabbi Dan will be joining five other gifted storytellers and musicians from California, Florida and Washington DC. It begins Erev Shavuot, June 11, at 7:45 PM Central time. Rabbi Dan is the fourth storyteller on the program, scheduled to begin approximately 8:50 PM. *Registration is required* to get the Zoom link. You will get an email on Monday with the link to register – NOTE: the registration link is different from the Zoom link that will be provided on Tuesday. *Chag Samayach!*

#### **Torah Portions for June 2024**

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

May 31-June 1, Be-hukkotai, Leviticus 26:5-27:34 In the last Torah portion of Leviticus, G-d promises that there will be great rewards for following the proper path of the commandments. Not only will the rain come at the proper times and produce our necessary food, but we will also live without fear of enemies. G-d will remember the promises made to Jacob, Isaac and to Abraham (curiously listed here in reverse order) to help us maintain our homeland. But "if you do not obey me and do not observe all these commandments...and you will break My covenant..." (Lev. 26:14) the consequences are quite dramatic. The drastic consequences of breaking the covenant take up much more room in the Torah portion than the blessings for upholding the commandments. A fascinating reminder that doing the right thing brings fulfillment of expectations, but violations can cause greater damage. We're also commanded to tithe, donating ten percent of all we gain, realizing that all our gifts come from the Holy One, and, while G-d allows us to keep 90%, we must be mindful of those less fortunate.

June 7-8, 2024 Bamidbar, Numbers 1:1-4:20 At the beginning of the Book of Numbers, Moses is instructed to take a census of the entire Israelite nation. Each of the tribes is listed with their descendants, and a number is assigned to each. Each tribe is given specific tasks. Aaron and his sons prepare the sacred objects and curtains connected to the Ark of the Covenant, where the tablets of the Ten Commandments are carried throughout the desert. This year, in preparation for the festival of Shavuot, Manny Miller will be reading the Ten Commandments, which solidify the covenant between Gd and the Jewish people.

#### June 14-15, 2024 Naso Numbers 4:21-7:89

"Naso" concludes the census, and the work of the various clans is described. Practical instructions are given regarding sanitary conditions in the Israelite camp and restitution for stolen property. To appease a suspicious husband, a "ritual in cases of jealousy" is given. People who wish to become Nazarites may not drink alcohol, have contact with a corpse or cut their hair.

We find the Priestly Benediction in this Torah portion, which has become a blessing for all life cycle events: "May the LORD bless you and watch over you; May the LORD's countenance shine upon you and be gracious to you; May the LORD's presence be with you, and may He grant you peace" (Numbers 6:24-26).

#### June 21-22, Beha'alotecha Numbers 8:1-12:16

The Israelites complain to Moses about their living conditions in the desert, and a disgusted Moses complains to God about them. God's response is to instruct Moses to delegate his power. Later Miriam and Aaron, Moses' brother and sister, demonstrate their jealousy by criticizing Moses, especially his choice of a Cushite wife. Miriam is punished with leprosy for her jealousy, but Moses pleads to God, "Heal her – heal her now!" Miriam's affliction lasts just seven days.

#### June 28-29, Shelach-Lecha Numbers 13:1-15:41

After hearing that the land of Israel is filled with giants, the people tell Moses and Aaron that they want to go back to Egypt. God furiously threatens to disown them and create a new nation, but Moses appeals to God's concern for His own reputation and God pardons the ingrates. Moses tells the people that the "ger" or stranger is to be treated like an Israelite, the Sabbath must be observed and tzitzit must be worn to remind them to observe all the commandments.

### For HAAM (Humble Area Assistance Ministries)

Our local partner, HAAM, works hard to keep the pantry stocked to help those in need. As we open our hearts to our own families, let us also remember others. You can bring non-perishable food donations to the temple, and we will arrange to get it to HAAM. Needed items include canned beans, canned fruit (low sugar), canned chicken and tuna and canned vegetables (low sodium). Pastas, sauces, breakfast cereals, mac and cheese and baby food. Hygiene items are also needed, like toilet paper, paper towels, toothbrushes, toothpaste, razors, soap, shampoo, and conditioner. This kind of tzedakah helps people hold onto dignity while receiving loving and necessary gifts. Thank you.
