RABBI'S MESSAGE

Be the Butterfly

The term "butterfly effect" was coined in the 1960s by <u>Edward Lorenz</u>, a meteorology professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, who was studying weather patterns. He devised a model demonstrating that if you compare two starting points indicating current weather that are near each other, they'll soon drift apart – and later, one area could wind up with severe storms, while the other is calm. With a mathematical formula, he noted that anything that happens in the world can affect the whole world. This is a very simplified summary of the theory, but it contends, for instance, that when a butterfly flaps its wings, the entire weather system can be affected, which has ramifications on agriculture, economics, people's moods, etc.

Do you ever wonder what kind of impact you have on the world? Sometimes, it is apparent and noticeable, but more often, it remains a mystery. How seemingly insignificant encounters (or significant ones for that matter) make a difference? Most of us rarely have the opportunity to find out how we have made a difference, and often, it may not be apparent to those who were affected.

As a rabbi and educator, every once in a while, I encounter a former student who shares with me that I made a difference. I am humble enough to know I might have been a VERY small part of that person's growth, but it is very exciting, nonetheless. The key to making a difference, I believe, is in partnership. I remember very early in my rabbinic career; a congregant who did not attend often wrote to me before High Holidays. He said, "Rabbi, I've had a very difficult year. I will be coming to Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur, and I need some real inspiration to help begin a new year with hope". I felt quite a bit of pressure. If things were so difficult, how could my words really make a difference? Words will not cure cancer, improve financial problems, get someone a new job or solve marital relationships. I asked myself, "what is this person hoping for?" I put him in my heart throughout the holidays, catching a glimpse throughout the services, praying I could somehow be helpful. When the holidays were over, I got another note: "Rabbi, thank you. I got just what I needed." I responded, "Whatever you got, it was because you were open to receiving."

We all have different gifts that can make a difference in others' lives and in the world. It could be a gift of food, a phone conversation, an email, a greeting card, or even just a smile. Often, just showing up is huge. When we let others know that we care, it's immeasurable how that can make an impact. One of my rabbinic colleagues gave a High Holiday sermon on the expression, "It's the thought that counts." He contended that thoughts are nice, but they don't *really* count until we act. What good is it to think about calling, or sending a card, or giving *tzedakah* if we don't follow through?

I am reminded of the famous story of the starfish in the sand. A man was walking along the beach after the tide had washed hundreds of starfish that could not make it back into the water. One at a time, he picked up a starfish and tossed it back into the ocean. An observer asked why he was doing it, and he responded, "They can't get back into the ocean on their own. If I don't toss them into the water, they'll die." The observer was incredulous. "This is a foolish waste of your time," he said. There are hundreds of starfish on this beach. And what about the other beaches nearby? You can't save them all! You can't possibly make a difference!"

The man picked up another starfish, tossed it into the water, and said, "Made a difference to *that* one!" The observer smiled for a moment, chuckled, and began picking up starfish himself.

When we make a small difference, we can set an example and be an inspiration for others. The impact is infinite. YOU can be that butterfly! Flap your wings! You may never find out the impact you might have made, but it doesn't really matter. Your presence in the world makes a difference.



Yahrtzeit Memorial Plaques

The minimum donation for one memorial plaque to be placed on the wall in the sanctuary remains \$300. However, those purchasing **two plaques at the same time can do so for \$500, a savings of \$100**. It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. You may consult with the rabbi for the Hebrew name and date by emailing Rabbi Dan Gordon at <u>rabbi@tbthumble.org</u> Checks must be sent to TBT prior to the plaque being ordered.

For HAAM (Humble Area Assistance Ministries)

Torah Portions for February 2025 Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

January 31-February 1, 2025 Bo, Exodus 10:1-13:16

The plagues continue with Pharoah's lack of response predictable, as G-d reveals to Moses, "I am hardening Pharaoh's heart in order to increase My wonders - so you will tell your children and grandchildren how I toyed with Egypt, and the wonders I put in them. And they shall know that I am God." (Exodus 10:1-2) For years, scholars and commentators wonder why ten plagues were necessary. The Torah suggests that the plagues had to be memorable enough for us to continue to retell the story. The Israelites receive instructions to place blood above our doorposts as a sign for the angel of death to "pass over" our homes, and the Torah reveals laws about how to remember Pesach/Passover in the future.

February 7-8, Beshalach Exodus 13:17-17:16

Finally set free by the Pharaoh, the Israelites depart from Egypt, only to be pursued by the ambivalent Pharaoh. God instructs Moses to lift his staff, and the Sea of Reeds parts for the Israelites to walk through on dry land. When Moses and the Israelites see the Egyptians drown in the Reed Sea, they sing a song of praise to God. Bitter reality of their journey causes them to complain to Moses their leader. In response, God sends manna to appease their hunger.

February 14-15, 2025 Yitro Exodus 18:1-20:23

Yitro, the portion named for Moses' father-in-law, begins with the Midianite priest's stunning confession that "the Lord is greater than all gods." Wise Jethro sees that Moses is taking too much on his own shoulders, and counsels his son-in-law to delegate his authority. The Ten Commandments are given by God in *Yitro*, amidst thunder and lightning, through Moses' voice. These commandments begin our relationship as a people with a special covenant with God that includes special responsibilities. They are not referred to as "Ten Commandments" at this point, and later called in Hebrew "*Aseret Dibrot*," or "Ten Words/Utterances." How the ten are divided differs between Judaism and Christianity, as well as within some Christian denominations.

February 21-22, Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18

"Mishpatim" means "rules," "laws" or "ordinances," and seems disorganized to the modern reader because the rules were meant to be remembered through hearing rather than reading. Both ritual and ethical laws are given in *Mishpatim*. Some of the most important laws concern ethical treatment for the stranger, the widow and the orphan. The first laws given after the Ten Commandments include treatment of slaves. While we were not forbidden to have slaves, we were commanded to treat them in a certain manner, which included offering freedom after seven years. It is a valuable lesson to remember, since we had just come out of slavery. Sometimes, we are expected to do the opposite of the examples of what we've observed from our experiences. In this case, we're expected to treat servants how we would have liked to have been treated, rather than how we were treated.

February 28-March 1 , Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19

We receive an elaborate description of how the Tabernacle is to be constructed, from the kind of wood used to the fabric for the drapes. Even though the construction is described in very elegant terms, we are encouraged only to make offerings from our hearts. A center piece in the Tabernacle will be the seven-branched menorah, which will be kept lit in an eternal light, signifying God's constant presence.

GENERAL FUND
