Morris has been dedicated to his Jewish faith and practice, almost never missing attending a synagogue on Shabbat or festivals, regardless of where he is in the world. Because he was a baby while the war was ending, Morris' firsthand knowledge comes only from the stories that his parents and other family members told him. We must keep hearing the stories while our survivors are still with us.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

Passover Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow

Welcome to the month of Nisan, 5785. This year, the lunar, Hebrew calendar aligns well with our Gregorian calendar. Nisan begins at the end of March, and Passover begins in the middle of April. Passover is always in the spring, because it represents the new life we embraced when we left Egypt on our 40-year journey in search of the Promised Land. The Hebrew calendar corrects itself to make sure that Passover remains in springtime, celebrating that newness that comes with growth. We are Jewish because of Passover. And we always will be, for several reasons.

First, there is the **story**. We read a *Haggadah*, which means the telling. But the Passover Haggadah is not the original story. Asking, "Why is this night different from all other nights," is as much about the rituals related to a Passover seder as it is about the biblical story of the Exodus from Egypt. The entire Book of Exodus tells the famous tale of being enslaved, being freed, and then setting out onto a journey of liberation.

The Torah tells the story, and the rabbis created rituals that help remind us of the key elements of bondage and of freedom. This powerful story includes horrific moments. We were tortured for hundreds of years. The Holy One heard our suffering over the generations and performed dramatic actions to demonstrate His power. He plagued our adversaries ten times, each plague worse than the previous one. We spent forty long years travelling through a mysterious desert, struggling with hunger, thirst, rebellion and uncertainty. The Passover story is filled with suffering. And thousands of years later, we turn it into a fun night of celebration.

It is the defining time of the Jewish people. We learn about suffering so we can be sensitive to the suffering of others. During our journey, we receive the Ten Commandments, solidifying our relationship with God, and our mutual commitments to each other. "*I will take you to be My people, and I will be your God.*" (Exodus 6:6-7) **This is an eternal covenantal relationship** – heavy stuff. So, when we observe it, why do we make it so fun?

I think it is because we have to. Suffering doesn't end. This year, we have human beings who were kidnapped on October 7, 2023, and tortured. Many have been killed. The war efforts to try to release the remaining hostages have devastated the land. Families of those hostages who are still in captivity are being tortured every day with the mystery of whether or not they will see their loved ones again. It makes it difficult and ironic to hold a freedom festival while some remain in captivity. Our Passover celebration must be a joyous reminder of hope. We spent hundreds of years enslaved in Egypt. We lost 6 million in the Holocaust. We endured the Crusades, the Spanish Inquisition and so many other moments that could have meant the end of the Jewish people. *And we have endured, survived and thrived!* The popular joke that some may feel lacks humor: "They tried to kill us, we're still here, so let's eat."

We don't forget those who have suffered and those who are still suffering. And we give today's generation and future generations so many reasons to hope.

Prior to Covid, "The Jewish Night of Why" was one of Temple Beth Torah's most popular annual events. It is simple, fun and engaging! The title of the evening is based on Alfred Kolatch's book series called, *The Jewish Book of Why*, which is a wonderful addition to every Jewish library. Kolatch's books give simple answers to hundreds of questions about Jewish ritual, holidays, practices, and customs with a technical scholarly perspective.

When TBT gathers, we discuss some of these questions but also focus on many of the philosophical issues that are part of the Jewish world today as well as our own community. It is a personal way for us to learn from each other. Participants pose their questions anonymously, by placing written questions in a "hat." Rabbi Dan's philosophy is that there is often a variety of possible reasons why Jews do what Jews do! He will offer his perspective about what's on your mind, and others will be able to discuss other possibilities. In the classic Jewish way, we will learn from each other!

There will be a movie for the kids in the Children's Classroom, while the adults are having their discussion.

Prior to the discussion, we will share a "potluck" dinner CROCKPOT Style – bring your favorite chillis, soup or crockpot meal. Other options are side dishes, drinks and desserts.

It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. Torah Portions for April 2025

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

April 4-5, 2025 Vayikrah Leviticus 1:1-5:26

"Vayikrah" is both the name of the book, which in English is translated as Leviticus, and the name of our Torah portion. While the book contains sacrificial practices which are completely out of date, the issue of the proper form of atonement for modern Jews is a contemporary one. According to some rabbinic commentators, prayer has replaced sacrifice for the modern Jew. The description of what constitutes sin in Leviticus demonstrates the ethical principles of our tradition. In Judaism, each individual must take responsibility for making amends to God: no person can sacrifice her or his life for another's.

April 11-12, 2025 Tzav Leviticus 6:1-8:36

G-d instructs Moses to teach Aaron and his sons the rights and duties they will take on in becoming priests. They, and their descendants, will be the ones to offer the sacrifices in the Sanctuary. A fire on the holy altar must be kept burning at all times in preparation for the sacrifices. The Kohanim (priests) must learn the variety of different offerings for peace, sin and guilt, and practice very specific rituals regarding each. Aaron and his sons remain in the sanctuary compound for seven days, and Moses initiates them into the priesthood.

<u>April 19-20, Special Reading for Shabbat during</u> <u>Passover - Exodus 33:12-34:26 and Numbers 28:19-25</u>

In the middle of Pesach, the Torah reading relates to a new beginning after the Israelites built a "Golden Calf" as an idol, and Moses, in anger, smashed the tablets of the Ten Commandments. G-d instructs Moses to construct new tablets to reconnect and help heal the relationship between Israelites, G-d and the Law. We are reminded of the importance of Shabbat and given instructions for the observance of Passover. The week of eating matzah is always in springtime, signifying annual rebirth and reconnections. Poignantly connected to the Golden Calf, this reading is a reminder that, even after making drastic mistakes, we have opportunities to cleanse ourselves and begin again.

April 25-26, 2025 Shemini, Leviticus 9:1-11:47

Immediately after their seven days of inauguration into the priesthood, Aaron and his sons begin to serve in their new capacity. The two elder sons, Nadav and Avihu, offer "a strange fire before G-d, which He commanded them not." Because of this strange fire, the two are consumed by the fire and die. Aaron remains silent. There is much discussion about why they died, and some commentaries claim the sons went beyond their roles as priests. This Torah portion also contains the laws regarding kashrut, and which animals are permitted and forbidden to be eaten.

GENERAL FUND
