RABBI'S MESSAGE

Teshuva for the Young and the Not-So-Young

*Return again...return again...return to the land of your soul.
Return to who you are; Return to what you are; Return to where you are...
Born and reborn again...
Return again...*

These words, written and composed by Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach (of blessed memory) have set the tone for many modern High Holy Day services. It focuses on the Hebrew concept of *teshuvah*, which we understand to mean “repentance,” but literally means “return.” We also focus on this concept in the more traditional liturgy when we plead for G-d’s mercy, confidently stating that “*tefilah, tzedakah, v’teshuva* – prayer, charity and repentance – will temper a severe decree.”

If repentance and return are synonymous, to what are we returning? In Rabbi Carlebach’s song, we return to our soul and to our past, somehow starting over again. The slow, repetitive and pensive music he composed implies that this *teshuvah*, this return, is an ongoing, never-ending process.

As I mentally and emotionally prepare for this New Year, I’ve been thinking about the concept of return. Growing means moving forward, not backwards. We hope to grow and change for the better. We want to learn from our mistakes and become better people based on what we have learned. Where is there room for a return? The past is over; the future is now.

Yet sometimes I observe a child marveling at something new. I hear a question I’ve never heard before. I see that “aha!” look when a child “gets it.” I study with a bar or bat mitzvah student as he or she discovers an aspect of Torah I hadn’t before considered. And I think about the innocence of youth. We think there is nothing new under the sun, and every day, a child uncovers a new truth. The Bible’s poetic book of Ecclesiastes proposes, “There is nothing new under the sun,” suggesting that everything that happens now has happened before; we just forgot about it. I take issue with that statement. Every moment is new if we notice.

On Yom Kippur, we contemplate where we’ve sinned, how we’ve fallen short of complete goodness and innocence. Perhaps the return we long for is a return to the innocent purity of our youth. Return to remembering what it’s like to find something new, to learn something exciting and invigorating, which makes us want to shout “Wow!” Rediscovering the naivety we had when we assumed that each new person we meet is a potential friend, and not someone who might be out to get us. As children, we always seem to remember the Golden Rule; adults sometimes forget.

Robert Fulghum, a Unitarian minister and author, wrote:

All I ever really needed to know I learned in kindergarten. Wisdom was not at the top of the graduate school mountain but there in the sandbox at nursery school.

These are the things I learned: Share everything. Play fair. Don’t hit people. Put things back where you found them. Clean up your own mess. Don’t take things that aren’t yours. Say you’re sorry when you hurt somebody. Wash your hands before you eat. Flush. Warm cookies and cold milk are good for you. Live a balanced life. Learn some and think some and draw and paint and sing and dance and play and work every day some.”

Our lives may be more complicated than the lives of five-year-olds. But there is certainly a lot of simple wisdom in the wonder of childhood that can lead us to a beautiful return, returning to embrace the wonder and newness of life.

Shana Tova – Happy New Year, 5786! I look forward to sharing it with you.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL HAPPENNINGS

We are looking forward to our first day of Religious School on September 7. A new school year is always exciting. Cantor Francyne will join us to welcome in the new school year with song. All of our teachers have a wonderful year planned that is filled with lessons on Jewish traditions, history, Israel, prayer, Torah, and Hebrew. Our confirmation class (8th – 10th grade) will study ethics and their Jewish place in the world.

Over the next few weeks, the classes will focus on Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah. The students will learn the traditions and meanings of these important holidays. Each class is also working on Hebrew skills from learning the alef bet to reading Hebrew as well as prayers for bar/bat mitzvah preparation.

The Shofar Factory from Living Legacy Chabad Outreach is coming to Temple Beth Torah on September 14. "The Shofar Factory begins with a discussion about Shofarot using backdrops and various horns. The highlight of the presentation is when the Shofar is actually crafted, starting with the raw horn of a ram. Participants saw, drill, polish and shellac the horn to create genuine kosher Shofarot. Students are taught how to sound the Shofar and how to follow the traditional sequence of notes blown on Rosh Hashanah." Each student will go home with their very own shofar!

"When you harvest your land, you shall not reap to the very edges of your field, or gather the gleanings of your harvest, or gather the fallen grapes of your vineyard. You shall leave them for the poor, the widows, the orphans and the foreigners." (Leviticus 19:9-10)

TBT Sisterhood is once again taking the lead this High Holiday season by distributing paper bags at Rosh Hashanah for our community to fill and bring back to the temple on Yom

Kippur. Many other faith-based communities will be participating in food drives as well and joining us once again in the "Competing in Goodness," program coordinated by the Minaret Foundation, an organization whose vision is "to see the world where faith communities seek each other's help to better the world as the norm, instead of the exception." All our donations will stay right here in our community.

At the conclusion of the food drives throughout the greater Houston area, in early November, there will be a multi-faith gathering where we will celebrate our collective mitzvah with other communities. Whether or not you fast on Yom Kippur, this is a wonderful opportunity to start our year by helping others.

Yahrtzeit Memorial Plaques

The minimum donation for one memorial plaque to be placed on the wall in the sanctuary remains \$300. However, those purchasing **two plaques at the same time can do so for \$500, a savings of \$100.** It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. You may consult with the rabbi for the Hebrew name and date by emailing Rabbi Dan Gordon at rabbi@tbthumble.org. Checks must be sent to TBT prior to the plaque being ordered.

Torah Portions for September 2025

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

September 5-6, Ki Tetze, Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19

There are seventy-two commandments in *Ki Tetze*, the largest number in any Torah portion. Topics covered include marriage and divorce, defiant children, fair weights and measures and charity for the poor. At the end of the *parsha* we are instructed to "blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven." While some look at Amalekites as a group of people, others have considered "Amalek" as the force of evil and hatred within our hearts. Many of the regulations teach us about righteous living. Others, such as how to handle a defiant child, convey problematic approaches that must be studied in the context of time, and perhaps should be read metaphorically. The punishment for a defiant child appears to suggest he be stoned to death. Since there are no references in which this punishment was actually administered, we can assume the Torah is encouraging us to look closely at behavior before casting immediate judgment.

September 12-13, Ki Tavo, Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

The *parshah* begins with a description of a ceremony to commemorate the occupation of the land. Some of every first fruit of the soil will be given to the priest as the exodus experience is retold. A tenth of the yield must be set-aside for the Levite, the stranger, the fatherless and the widow. Blessings and curses, some extremely graphic, are recited to motivate the people to observe the covenant.

September 19-20, Nitzavim, Deuteronomy 29:9-30:20

Nitzavim is read twice a year: once on its calendar date and once on Yom Kippur. It is no mere recapitulation but instead is a talk about the future. Moses' speech to the Israelites just before they enter the Land of Israel reveals that in Judaism, belief flows from behavior. Moses reminds the Israelites that God's words, teachings and spirit are not meant to be distant, but are close to us, in our hearts.

September 26-27, Va-Yelech Deuteronomy 31:1-30

In *Vayelech* Moses announces to the Israelites that at one hundred and twenty years old, he is no longer active. He publicly transfers his authority to Joshua and empowers the Levites to bring the Teachings of the Torah into the Ark of Covenant. Moses warns the Israelites to remember all of G-d's commandments by re-reading the teachings even after his own death.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.
