Yom Kippur Afternoon Discussion Being Jewish the Rest of the Year Thursday, October 2, Approximately 1-2 PM Led by Erica Robinson Winsor

On Yom Kippur after the morning service and before the afternoon service, it has become a tradition at TBT to gather for an informal, yet organized discussion. The topic this year is "Yom Kippur is over; how do I maintain my Jewish identity the rest of the year?" Our facilitator, Erica Robinson Winsor, is a product of Houston Jewish day schools, and was even a student of Rabbi Dan Gordon when she was in middle school! A former Assistant District Attorney specializing in working with offenders with mental health issues, Erica is also a regional board member of the Anti-Defamation League. In this role, she has visited TBT in the past, facilitating discussions with teenagers in our religious school. She is currently the Public Affairs Director at the Jewish Federation of Greater Houston. She is married with two young children.

RABBI'S MESSAGE

TALMUDIC BILL PAYING

As we listen to the final blast of the shofar at the end of Yom Kippur, we can embrace another clean slate. It is a great opportunity to take some time and examine how we've been living our lives and how we plan to proceed in the future. This is called the *Cheshbon Ha-Nefesh*, or "accounting of the soul." By learning these concepts, we understand that we are accountable for our actions. At the beginning of the year, we can contemplate what we believe God expects of us, and what we expect of ourselves. The Talmud suggests that at the end of our days, we will be asked six questions to demonstrate our accomplishments in this world.

- 1) Were you honest in business?
- 2) Did you make time for learning?
- 3) Did you engage in procreation?
- 4) Did you hope for salvation?
- 5) Did you add to the wisdom of the world?
- 6) Did you have a mystical relationship with God?

(adapted from the Babylonian Talmud, Tractate Shabbat 31a)

While each of these questions may seem simple at first glance, they are questions we can all look at and commit ourselves to strive for positive outcomes.

Were you honest in business? All of us have business relationships, whether as consumers or proprietors. When we represent ourselves honestly, we are true to who we are. Our identity is sacred, and we must always be careful to represent ourselves that way.

Did you make time for learning? Pirke Avot (Ethics of our Fathers) says, "Do not say, 'When I have time, I will study,' because you will never have time." There are many avenues available to all of us for learning. We can learn from the Torah during Shabbat services, take a class, or merely engage others in conversations that involve thinking, listening and respecting the opinions of others.

Did you engage in procreation? This is not only about having children. Procreation, in this respect, means promoting positive influence on others. Anyone who we encounter is someone who can learn from us. We have engaged in procreation each time something we do or say has an influence on others. Therefore, we must be careful about our words, because people are learning from us all the time.

Did you hope for salvation? The 10 Commandments has one commandment that is not about action, but about emotion (Thou shalt not covet). Likewise, this list has one that is about emotion. Hope is something all of us can do, but it is not always easy, especially when unspeakable things keep happening. I once heard a Holocaust survivor answer the question, "Did you ever lose hope?" She said, "Hope is what kept us alive." Hope not only keeps us alive, but it also helps us to *really* live.

Did you add wisdom to the world? Again, from Pirke Avot: "Who is wise? Those who can learn from everyone." Each of us has something special to share. We never know when the things we take for granted may be just the wisdom that someone else is looking for.

Did you have a mystical relationship with God? This may be the hardest one to measure, and clearly a life-long pursuit. Our relationships with God are very much like our relationships with people: intangible connections that include intense love and difficult challenges. When we remember that each human being is created in the image of God, our human relationships become sacred.

The New Year is a perfect time to "check our balance" -- to see if we are paid up to date with these important questions. Each of us can do our best to settle these accounts. If we have truly done our best, we can look at ourselves in the mirror -- seeing one of G-d's sacred creations -- and feel debt-free.

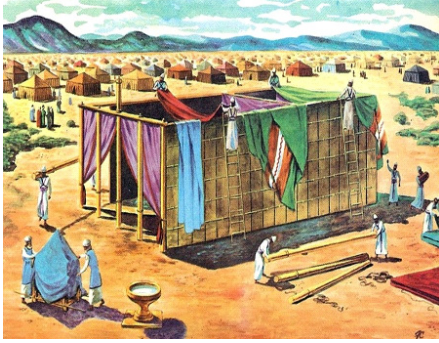
Join a Committee!

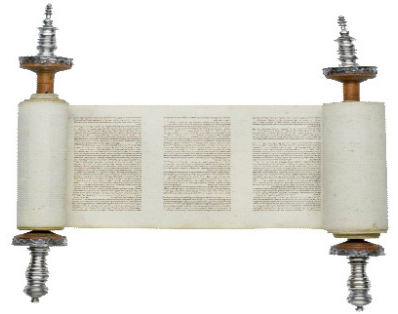
A new committee that is being brought back is the caring committee. This committee is designed to remember members on special occasions, help with meals if ill, and brighten people's lives.

Yahrtzeit Memorial Plaques

The minimum donation for one memorial plaque to be placed on the wall in the sanctuary remains \$300. However, those purchasing **two plaques at the same time can do so for \$500, a savings of \$100.** It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. You may consult with the rabbi for the Hebrew name and date by emailing Rabbi Dan Gordon at rabbi@tbthumble.org. Checks must be sent to TBT prior to the plaque being ordered.

Torah Portions for October 2025

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

October 3-4, Ha'Azinu Deuteronomy 32:1-52

Moses, nearing the end of his life, passionately uses poetry and song to recount the journey in the desert. At the conclusion of the song, God instructs Moses to climb to the top of Mount Nebo, overlooking the Jordan River. This is where Moses will die, able to see the Promised Land, but not enter it. God explains this is because Moses broke faith with an expression of anger. When his sister, Miriam died, and the Israelites were worried about water, God told Moses to speak to a rock to get water; instead, Moses struck the rock twice. God had determined Moses, at 120 years old, was the right leader to lead the Israelites out of Egypt and through the desert, but there will be a new leader – Joshua – the next steps of the way.

October 10-11, Sukkot and Simchat Torah Celebration

Ve-Zot Ha-B'racha, Deuteronomy 33:1-34:10 and Bereshit, Genesis 1:1-6:8

For our Simchat Torah celebration, we repeat the last lines of Deuteronomy and begin immediately with the first passages in Genesis. Torah is a never-ending learning process, so as soon as we finish, we begin again, searching for new insights. The end of Deuteronomy is Moses' love song to the nation of Israel and the gentle transition of leadership to Joshua. It includes Moses' closing speech, his death, his status as our greatest teacher, and acknowledgment of his special relationship with G-d. The opening chapters of Torah outline God's creation of the world day-by-day, and move into the struggles of the human family. These passages include commonly known stories; Adam and Eve eating the forbidden fruit, Cain's murder of his brother, Abel and the Tower of Babel, leading up to the time of Noah.

October 17-18, 2025 Bereishit, Genesis, 1:1-6:8

As our New Year has begun, we are now ready to repeat the cycle of Torah learning, beginning with Genesis, and the creation of the world. It is significant to repeat the first portion, as with the many mistakes our ancestors made (listed above), we remember that every year, God gives us a "do-over." We learn of many beginnings from the first families.

October 24-25, 2025 Noah, Genesis 6:9-11:32

Noah's story is also about new beginnings. Noah, having been "righteous in his day" gains God's trust, and his family becomes the sole survivors of the Great Flood.

Continued.....

The evil world was washed away, and Noah and his family gave the opportunity to rebuild and repopulate. God makes everlasting promises to mankind. The rainbow tells us that God will never again destroy the world, and Noah's line will lead us to Abraham, with whom God will connect the eternal covenants.

October 31-November 1, 2025 Lech L'Cha, Genesis 12:1-17:27

G-d speaks to Abram for the first time, establishing both blessings and covenants. Abram shows his faith to G-d by leaving his home and following G-d's plan. It is unclear from the Torah why Abram was chosen, but *midrashic* stories hint the Abram had a special connection, believing in one G-d when others worshipped idols. In one popular midrash, young Abraham smashes idols in his father's shop to prove they are not gods. G-d changes his name to Abraham, which means "father of many," and promises that he will be blessed by all nations, and will have a legacy of many offspring.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.

TOM THERIOT MEMORIAL PROGRAM FUND

This fund supports special dynamic programs, often related to the arts. It is named after Tom Theriot, a lover of the arts, who was a constant presence at TBT and supported every cause.

LEGACY GIVING SOCIETY
