RABBI'S MESSAGE

Better Already

Adonai natan, Adonai lakach, y'he shem Adonai m'varach The Holy One give, the Holy One takes away, blessed be the Holy Name.

The Book of Job teaches us to embrace happy times and difficult times as all part of God's world. What a diversity of emotions have been flowing through our people since it appears an end is in sight to the war in Gaza!

Wonderful joy when 20 living Israeli hostages were released. Mixed with the concern of how much physical and emotional damage occurred from more than two years in captivity. And with that joy, also comes the mourning for those who were kidnapped, tortured and murdered, who did not survive. And those whose lives were forever affected by having their loved ones taken away from them. And also, all those human lives that were lost and damaged with the war that came in the aftermath, both Israelis and Palestinians; and all the human beings who left their homes and now have no home to return to. It's hard to rejoice in the midst of such tragedy and such uncertainty about the future – and yet, those living humans who returned from captivity need and deserve all the care in the world.

And to punctuate these mixed emotions, we just celebrated Simchat Torah, reciting and remembering Moses' last days and then immediately beginning again with remembering the beginning. Because the initial October 7 attack was on Simchat Torah, 2023, the day we celebrate the joy of learning will now forever be associated with the most brutal of attacks. Our Simchat Torah this year was all joy, with a record crowd of children and adults dancing around and learning from a Torah scroll that encircled the sanctuary.

And so, we begin again. Begin to heal, and begin a new year of learning from Torah.

Rabbi Daniel Gordis (his name sounds a lot like mine, but he is much more learned) writes a blog called *Israel from the Inside*. Born and educated in the U.S., Rabbi Gordis long ago made Israel his home and raised his family there. I had an opportunity to learn from Rabbi Gordis, once in Israel and once when he was a guest scholar in Houston. In his recent blog, he said that, for the last two years, if you asked someone "how are you?" the response was often a shrug of the shoulders. "How should it be?" or "For us, it's fine" (if it was). Now, the response is often "Better."

Because things *do* get better. Our people have suffered countless tragedies over the centuries, from the destruction of the Holy Temple to the Crusades to the Holocaust to the wars in Israel. Every time, we bounce back. Every time, we learn from the exercise of rebuilding, both our communities and our confidence. Hopefully, we are now at a lull in our worry. As Tevya said in Fiddler on the Roof, "I know it is quite an honor to be the 'Chosen People.' But once in a while, maybe You could choose someone else?"

Despite the uncertainty of the future, I am filled with optimism. Every Sunday, I see children eager to learn, and (again in Tevya's words) "asking questions that could cross a rabbi's eyes!" Friday nights, the children are coming more often than ever before, parading with their new mini-Torahs and demonstrating that Shabbat is real family time. And when the young people are excited about being Jewish, it's truly contagious!

Two upcoming Shabbat services put an exclamation point on the spirit of TBT. **Friday, November 7** will be "Legacy Shabbat." The Houston Jewish Community Foundation will be sponsoring a Shabbat dinner for us, as we will look toward the future and honor our members who have committed themselves to a strong community. The next week, **November 14**, our students will lead services, guided by myself and Cantor Francyne Davis Jacobs, who has enhanced our children's music education program immeasurably. Cantor Francyne will also be providing the music for Legacy Shabbat.

In the first chapter of Genesis, God looks at the world every day and proclaims it "good." At the end of six days, God looks at the whole world and says, "very good."

As people, it's our job to make it better. And we will!

Inspiring and entertaining, the Ann and Stephen Kaufman Jewish Book & Arts Festival at the Evelyn Rubenstein Jewish Community Center annually delivers a variety of opportunities for the community to learn and experience Jewish literary, culture and the arts. The Book Festival is one of the largest events of its kind in the U.S., attracting established and emerging writers from around the world, representing a myriad of themes and drawing a large and varied audience. Bestselling authors highlight over 20 events during this two-week period, and the finest Jewish literature is available for purchase. The authors will be speaking about their recent books. Among the highlights:

Heart of a Stranger: an unlikely rabbi's story of faith, identity and belonging, by Rabbi Angela Buchdahl. Rabbi Buchdahl is a Korean-American woman who has become one of the most respected rabbis in America.

As a Jew: Reclaiming our story from those who blame, shame and try to erase us, by Sarah Hurwitz. Ms. Hurwitz, a former presidential speechwriter, grew up in a very "ordinary" suburban Jewish household. Distanced from Judaism much of her adult life, she rediscovered her Jewish soul and has written extensively, including her first book, Here All Along.

Raising Resilience: How to help our children THRIVE in Times of Uncertainty, by Tovah P. Klein Becoming Caitlin Clark, by Howard Megdal

The Prosecutor: One Man's Battle to bring Nazis to Justice, by Jack Fairweather

HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE ASSOCIATION AND GARDEN OF HOPE IN KINGWOOD ONGOING TOURS AVAILABLE AND NOVEMBER PROGRAMS

Are you aware that there is a Holocaust Garden of Hope at King's Harbor in Kingwood? The Garden offers ongoing tours and educational programs, honoring victims, survivors and rescuers. Its vision is "to see the world inspired to stand in solidarity against persecution, prejudice, and indifference." For 15 years, the Holocaust Remembrance Association (HRA) has sponsored a "March of Remembrance," that includes speakers and awareness, and regular involvement of Holocaust survivors and rescuers. In addition, German nationals who are descendants of Nazi perpetrators participate in efforts to reconcile what their relatives had done in the past with the pledge of "Never Again."

On Friday, November 14, at 11 AM, the HRA is hosting a luncheon called "Beauty for Ashes" at the Walden on Lake Houston Golf and Country Club. Keynote speaker is author Dr. Susanna Kokkonen, former Director of Christian Friends of Yad Vashem (the Holocaust Memorial Museum in Israel) and will honor Jose Castellanos, a descendant of a Righteous Among the Nations hero responsible for rescuing over 40,000 Hungarian Jews. The luncheon is part of a full weekend conference called "Restoring Hope: Insights from the Holocaust at this critical hour."

Yahrtzeit Memorial Plaques

It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. Torah Portions for November 2025

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

October 31-November 1, 2025 Lech L'Cha, Genesis 12:1-17:27

G-d speaks to Abram for the first time, establishing both blessings and covenants. Abram shows his faith to G-d by leaving his home and following G-d's plan. It is unclear from the Torah why Abram was chosen, but *midrashic* stories hint the Abram had a special connection, believing in one G-d when others worshipped idols. In one popular midrash, young Abraham smashes idols in his father's shop to prove they are not gods. G-d changes his name to Abraham, which means "father of many," and promises that he will be blessed by all nations, and will have a legacy of many offspring.

November 7-8, 2025 Vayeira, Genesis 18:1-22:24

There are many tests in this Torah portion. Visitors come to see Abraham, and he welcomes them with extraordinary hospitality. Sarah and Abraham learn that, despite their advanced years, they will have a son together. Sarah laughs at the possibility, leading to the child being named Isaac ("she will laugh). G-d consults with Abraham about His plan to destroy Sodom and Gemorrah, and Abraham negotiates a plan to try to save the city. Later, Abraham is tested by being asked by G-d to sacrifice Isaac. Abraham is prepared to make this ultimate sacrifice before an angel of G-d stops him, and a ram is sacrificed instead of his son.

November 14-15, 2025 Chaya Sarah, Genesis 23:1-25:18

Almost immediately after the near-death of her son, Sarah dies at 127 years old. Abraham wants to make sure she has an honorable burial. Though the landowner offers to give him burial land for free, Abraham insists on paying the full price. He then sends his servant to look for a wife for Isaac. Rebecca, a distant cousin, is chosen because her kindness to humans and animals indicates a unique sensitivity.

November 21-22, 2025 Toldot, Genesis 25:19-28:9

The most volatile sibling rivalry since Cain and Abel begins with the twins, Esau and Jacob, battling in the womb. Mother Rebecca is told by G-d that the greater of the two shall serve the younger. Esau sells Jacob his birthright for some soup, and Jacob collects the blessing of the firstborn with Rebecca's help. Having built a brotherly relationship based on trickery, deceit and manipulation, Jacob and Esau realize that the town isn't big enough for both of them. Both brothers go to uncles. Jacob travels to Rebecca's father's house (where he will marry both of Laban's daughters), and Esau finds himself a wife from the daughters of Uncle Ishmael.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND

This fund provides scholarships to Jewish summer camps for children and for educational conferences for teachers. It also helps support special educational programs that are not in the general budget. The fund honors Tracy Tobin Johnson, who was an active TBT member, volunteer and teacher before passing away at a young age.
