RABBI'S MESSAGE

What is a Ner Tamid?

If you turn off all the lights in the Temple Beth Torah sanctuary, one flicker remains. There it is, twinkling away with the tiny strength of 20 watts or so. Not enough power to read, but just enough to make its presence known. Follow that light and you'll find the Torah. We call it *Ner Tamid*, or Eternal Light, that is meant to stay lit for generations to come.

About thirty years ago, I was principal of a high school learning program and youth group advisor at a large synagogue in Houston. The rabbi said to me, "Look at the teenagers for leadership. Young children dream of being older, when they can be teenagers. Adults dream of being younger, when they *were* teenagers. If you find some good teenagers, they will influence both younger and older people." I'm not sure if it always works that way, but I saw a great example of leadership and role modeling on the sixth night of Hanukkah at Temple Beth Torah.

We were in the middle of a spirited Hanukkah/Shabbat service. The room was full and over 120 little candles were glowing. Cantor Francyne had gotten the children dancing like dreidels. I played my traditional "stump the rabbi" game with the *I had a Little Dreidel* song, challenging people to propose a different word to rhyme than "I made it out of clay." The first example was a child who suggested, "I made it out of wood," and I responded with "I ate too many latkes/that didn't feel so good!" It seems every year a child wants to hear what I can rhyme with "glass."

The evening was getting long. We had three songs left on our play list, and only time for one. The cantor and I decided to sing Debbie Friedman's silly and lively rendition of *I am a Latke*. A fourteen-year-old boy started dancing by himself in the back. A few moments later, a younger boy began dancing with him. I made a subtle motion with my eyes and gestured for them to bring it to the front of the room. The two enthusiastic dancers caught the eye of three young girls in the front row, and the teen gave them the same eye contact and gesture I had just given him, inviting them to join the dance. Moments later, there was an all-ages parade of a dozen or more young people from two to 27 making circles throughout the sanctuary with adults clapping along, enjoying the spectacle.

This was a moment that will have lasting memories. When those who were there think about Hanukkah in the future, the sight of a full spectrum of young people dancing around the synagogue will bring us smile. The *ner tamid* is a little spark that can ignite brightness and warmth. Our small temple's Hanukkah celebration, between the dozens of burning candles and the dancing youngsters created the kind of spark that can help our temple shine continuously. All it needs is for us all to notice, and find our own ways to ignite the passion of sharing a community.

On February 28, we will have a chance to celebrate four sparks, the lights of a family who each has spread warmth in different ways. The ***Blumin Family Four***. As the sixth annual **Ner Tamid/Eternal Light** honorees, the Blumins follow the legacy of **Hy Penn, Joni Levy, Jeff Kaufman** (of blessed memory), **Carrie Keith** and **Anita Bonanno**. Jeremy, through his devotion to the physical building and grounds, Stacey with her tireless efforts to keep us organized and informed, Rachael with her incomparable teaching skills and ability to connect with young children, and Aaron, with his unbridled enthusiasm, are all examples of what a TBT family can be. Each has unique ways of enhancing our community. And together, they touch almost every aspect of temple life. With their devotion, their individual and collective sparks help keep our community strong.

Please join us at the Ner Tamid celebration, as we honor the Blumins and the spirit of Temple Beth Torah.

NER TAMID EVENING TO FEATURE OPERA LEGGERA WITH A PROGRAM DEVELOPED ESPECIALLY FOR TEMPLE BETH TORAH AND OUR AWARD RECIPIENTS

On February 28, Temple Beth Torah's *Ner Tamid* celebration will be blessed with the musical talents of four principle singers from the popular theatre company Opera Leggera. Known for their professional skills and innovation, each has been part of creating wonderful programs in the Kingwood area and beyond. And now, they will bring their gifts to enhance the honoring of the Blumins at our annual *Ner Tamid* fundraiser. They include:

Tenor, Chris Holloway, a native Texan who has performed throughout the United States and abroad. He has performed for Houston Grand Opera as well as with the L.A. Philharmonic Orchestra, the Cardiff Opera in Wales and with the Israeli Opera in Tel Aviv. His portrayal of King David was the highlight of the Jerusalem 2000 Festival. He is General Director of Opera Leggera (light opera), which he founded with his wife, Sasha, in 2005.

Mezzo Soprano, Sasha Holloway, originally from Odessa, Ukraine, has been part of operas and theatre companies in Ukraine, Israel, Florida and Houston. As Artistic Director of Opera Leggera, she has created, created, directed and produced more than 50 original musical and theatrical productions. Sasha and her daughter, Hannah, co-created an original biographical musical drama *Janusz and Stefa*, inspired by the final months of the Polish-Jewish educator and writer Janusz Korczak and the children of his orphanage in the Warsaw ghetto.

Soprano, Hannah Holloway-Auchter, performed onstage for the first time at the age of three. She has been involved in every aspect of the Opera Leggera performing arts productions, but shines most as a singer and actress. Co-creating *Janusz and Stefa* with her mother was one of her most satisfying accomplishments.

Baritone, Christopher Auchter is a Houston-based professional singer, keyboardist, and choral conductor. He earned a degree in Music and Vocal Performance from the University of Texas (Austin), and his work reflects a broad musical background that spans art song, oratorio, choral repertoire, and operatic performance. He has performed with numerous opera companies, both in the chorus and as a soloist, and is also a conductor, keyboardist and educator.

MARCH OF REMEMBRANCE 2026 – HONORING VICTIMS, SURVIVORS AND RESCUERS SUNDAY, JANUARY 25, 2026 1:00 – 4:00 PM in Kingwood

Every year since 2012, Kingwood has hosted an annual March of Remembrance. This is a multi-faith event organized by the Holocaust Remembrance Association (HRA). Christians and Jews come together to honor those who were affected by the Holocaust, and provide information and education for people of all ages. Among the speakers will be Holocaust survivor Michael Siegel. Also sharing with the group will be Claudia Kiesinger, whose relatives were Nazi perpetrators. Claudia speaks frequently about her personal mission to rid the world of prejudice, breaking the cycle that existed in Germany when her relatives were involved in World War II. Kingwood is now home to the Holocaust Garden of Hope at King's Harbor. Please visit www.hra18.org for more information. The program is free, and registration on the website is REQUIRED to get the specific location of the event.

HRA's program is in January to coincide with United Nations Holocaust Remembrance Day, which is annually on January 27. Temple Beth Torah will host our own Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Shabbat service on Friday, April 17, 2026, and we are thrilled to have Cantorial Soloist Anita Bonanno to join us once again.

Acheinu kol beyt Yisrael begins a prayer dating back to 9th Century C.E. in Babylon that means, in effect, “We are all one family.” It is a central aspect of Judaism that we look out for each other. The Talmud states, “Whoever saves one life, has saved an entire world.” (Sanhedrin 4:5) And the Torah says, “Do not stand idly by while a neighbor bleeds.” (Leviticus 19:16) One of our family members, Andrea Miller, needs a kidney transplant to maintain a healthy life.

Andrea and her husband, Mike, have been valuable members of Temple Beth Torah since they first joined, over 15 years ago, shortly before their son, Manny, came into their lives. Both have served on the board and Mike is the current president. Andrea has served as treasurer, ritual chair and coordinates our security, cleaning services and bills payable. Both Mike and Andrea are volunteer teachers in Sunday School, and their boys, Manny and Levi, willingly help out whenever needed.

The efforts to find a kidney for Andrea are being coordinated by Renewal, a non-profit organization dedicated to saving lives by helping kidney donors and kidney recipients navigate all aspects of the transplant process. Testing is easy; finding the perfect match is not. There is complete anonymity with any questions. The staff at Renewal can answer any questions about the safety of being a kidney donor. Passing this information along to anyone you know will help spread the word and help Renewal have a list of potential matches for Andrea and other patients in need. RABBI DAN BRINGS THE TBT SPIRIT TO PHILLY

In April 2025, Rabbi Dan Gordon was elected President of OHALAH, a multi-denominational clergy association representing rabbis, cantors and rabbinic chaplains from all over the United States, Canada and Europe. January 8-15, Rabbi Dan will be presiding over his first conference since becoming president.

The full name of the organization is OHALAH: Association of Rabbis Cantors and Rabbinic Chaplains for Jewish Renewal. You may ask, “What is Jewish Renewal?” Jewish Renewal, in short, combines a philosophy of prayer and study with an attempt to blend ancient tradition to meaningful Jewish experiences. Founded by a former Hasidic rabbi, Zalman Schachter Shalomi (of blessed memory), Renewal includes a wide variety of observance styles and practices. There are a small number of “Jewish Renewal” synagogues, as well as many clergy who bring their knowledge and desire to many different professional ways of worship, education and spiritual care.

The organization is called OHALAH, which means “the big tent,” because it includes clergy from different denominations within Judaism as well as those whose connection might be considered “post denominational.” Jewish Renewal does have its own seminary, through its sister organization ALEPH, and about 60% of the clergy in OHALAH were ordained in the Aleph Ordination Program. The rest include Reform, Conservative and Orthodox ordinations, as well as various alternative programs.

While Temple Beth Torah is considered “Reform in style,” using prayerbooks published by the Reform movement, Rabbi Dan considers himself a “pluralistic” rabbi. Having studied with teachers from all movements, he says, “I wanted to be able to be familiar with all traditions and connect with Jewish people from different perspectives.”

He is excited to learn from the wide variety of Jewish perspectives in OHALAH, and help to contribute to “renewing Judaism” for the great spectrum of Jewish people.

It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. Torah Portions for January 2026

January 2-3, 2026

Va-Y'chi, Genesis 47:28-50:26

Jacob, at 147 years old, blesses his grandchildren, Efraim and Menasseh, blessing the younger before the elder. He makes Joseph promise to have him buried with his forefathers in Canaan. Jacob calls all his sons to him, and tells each what he thinks of them. After his death, Jacob's sons take him to Canaan for burial and then returned to Egypt. Joseph dies at 110 years old, after reconciling with his brothers again. The Biblical family is at home in Egypt as Genesis ends.

Shemot Exodus 1:1-6:1

We begin the Book of Exodus with the sons of Israel (Jacob) and their families settled in Egypt. But a new king arises who does not honor the relationship Joseph had established. Because of Pharaoh's fear of a revolt, male Hebrew babies are ordered to be killed. With the help of conspiring midwives, Shifra and Puah, Moses' mother saves him by putting him in a basket where he is later found by Pharaoh's daughter and adopted. Moses kills an Egyptian taskmaster and flees to Midian. He marries, and while watching his father-in-law's sheep, G-d appears to Moses out of a burning bush that is not consumed. G-d reveals His plan to free the Israelites, and sends Moses and his brother Aaron to speak to Pharaoh about freeing the Hebrew slaves.

January 16-17, 2026

Va-eira Exodus 6:2-9:35

G-d reveals His sacred name to Moses, and tells him that he is the first one to know it. G-d assures Moses that He will be with him as he negotiates with Pharaoh. The plagues begin: blood, frogs, vermin, locusts, cattle disease, boils and hail; but each time, Pharaoh's heart is hard, and he does not free the Hebrew slaves.

January 23-24, 2026

Bo, Exodus 10:1-13:16

The plagues continue with Pharaoh's lack of response predictable, as G-d reveals to Moses, "*I am hardening Pharaoh's heart in order to increase My wonders - so you will tell your children and grandchildren how I toyed with Egypt, and the wonders I put in them. And they shall know that I am God.*" (Exodus 10:1-2) For years, scholars and commentators wonder why ten plagues were necessary. The Torah suggests that the plagues had to be memorable enough for us to continue to retell the story. The Israelites receive instructions to place blood above our doorposts as a sign for the angel of death to "pass over" our homes, and the Torah reveals laws about how to remember Pesach/Passover in the future.

January 30-31, 2026

Beshalach Exodus 13:17-17:16

Finally set free by the Pharaoh, the Israelites depart from Egypt, only to be pursued by the ambivalent Pharaoh. God instructs Moses to lift his staff, and the Sea of Reeds parts for the Israelites to walk through on dry land. When Moses and the Israelites see the Egyptians drown in the Reed Sea, they sing a song of praise to God. Bitter reality of their journey causes them to complain to Moses their leader. In response, God sends manna to appease their hunger.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.
