RABBI'S MESSAGE

ALL WE NEED IS VAV:

How One Vital letter can help us with diversity and heal Beyond Divides

I recently attended a conference of clergy in which the keynote speaker used this title for his 90-minute teaching. The speaker was Rabbi Amichai Lau-Lavie, recognized as one of the strongest voices in Judaism today. Rabbi Amichai was born in Israel, and is the 39th generation of rabbis in his family, dating back to the 11th Century. He is the first non-Orthodox rabbi in the line. His father was an Israeli Consul General, and his uncle was Chief Rabbi of Israel for 10 years. He came to the U.S. as a young man and developed innovative ways to teach Torah and lead community, founding STORAHtelling – dramatic ways to deeply learn Jewish text – and Lab/Shul, an experimental synagogue in New York. I've known Amichai personally for over 30 years, through our shared love of theatre. A 2016 graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary, he is officially a Conservative rabbi, but broke away from the Conservative movement because he agrees to officiate weddings of Jewish people to non-Jewish people. His philosophy mirrors my own on that subject, saying, "A couple comes to me—the woman is Jewish and the man isn't. They want to get married, but he doesn't want to convert. They want to be part of our community, to raise their children as Jews. If I tell them 'no,' we've lost them and their children, and that's it."

Vav, sixth letter of the Hebrew alphabet, is a simple letter, a straight, vertical line. The V sound is formed by lips and teeth collaborating with a vibrating tone that is flexible in length; it can be spoken quickly or dragged out. When a dot is on top of the letter, it becomes a vowel – the O sound. When the dot drops to the middle of the Vav, the vowel is OO. Both the O and the OO can also make short or long sounds, depending on how they are voiced. The letter looks stiff, but is very versatile.

When the vav stands alone in front of a word, it simply means "and."

Rabbi Amichai's lecture focused on the geographical, political and philosophical divide of the northern and southern areas in Israel. Israel enjoyed unity during the reigns of King David and King Solomon, and then one nation became two, Israel and Judea. The "and" that could connect, became a separation. The rabbi's lesson got me thinking about the importance of that little "and" in Torah AND in our lives.

When we recite Shema in our worship service, it comes from Deuteronomy 6:4. The next paragraph, 6:5-9, starts with V'ahavta. In our prayer book it says in our prayer book, "You shall love..." – but if it were translated literally, it would say, **AND** you shall love." The "and" connects the paragraph about love with the statement about one God for all. That connection makes a world of difference. Throughout the Torah, countless paragraphs begin with "Vayomer Adonai" or "Vayidaber Adonai" – "And God spoke" or "AND God said." All of our teachings are connected to each other, as different as they may be. Likewise, all Jews – and I daresay, all humans – are connected to each other.

What divides us? We have our labels and our loyalties. We can hold fast to the notion that someone who lives, works, dresses, worships, loves or thinks differently is **WRONG**. That there is only one right answer to every situation. That we have a monopoly on truth, and one who disagrees with us is evil. While prejudice against Jews has led to persecution, prejudice within our people, judgments about the right or wrong way to be Jewish, disrupts our unity.



NER TAMID EVENING TO FEATURE OPERA LEGGERA WITH A PROGRAM DEVELOPED ESPECIALLY FOR TEMPLE BETH TORAH AND OUR AWARD RECIPIENTS

On February 28, Temple Beth Torah's *Ner Tamid* celebration will be blessed with the musical talents of four principle singers from the popular theatre company Opera Leggera. Known for their professional skills and innovation, each has been part of creating wonderful programs in the Kingwood area and beyond. And now, they will bring their gifts to enhance the honoring of the Blumins at our annual *Ner Tamid* fundraiser. They include:

Tenor, Chris Holloway, a native Texan who has performed throughout the United States and abroad. He has performed for Houston Grand Opera as well as with the L.A. Philharmonic Orchestra, the Cardiff Opera in Wales and with the Israeli Opera in Tel Aviv. His portrayal of King David was the highlight of the Jerusalem 2000 Festival. He is General Director of Opera Leggera (light opera), which he founded with his wife, Sasha, in 2005.

Mezzo Soprano, Sasha Holloway, originally from Odessa, Ukraine, has been part of operas and theatre companies in Ukraine, Israel, Florida and Houston. As Artistic Director of Opera Leggera, she has created, created, directed and produced more than 50 original musical and theatrical productions. Sasha and her daughter, Hannah, co-created an original biographical musical drama *Janusz and Stefa*, inspired by the final months of the Polish-Jewish educator and writer Janusz Korczak and the children of his orphanage in the Warsaw ghetto.

Soprano, Hannah Holloway-Auchter, performed onstage for the first time at the age of three. She has been involved in every aspect of the Opera Leggera performing arts productions, but shines most as a singer and actress. Co-creating *Janusz and Stefa* with her mother was one of her most satisfying accomplishments.

Baritone, Christopher Auchter is a Houston-based professional singer, keyboardist, and choral conductor. He earned a degree in Music and Vocal Performance from the University of Texas (Austin), and his work reflects a broad musical background that spans art song, oratorio, choral repertoire, and operatic performance. He has performed with numerous opera companies, both in the chorus and as a soloist, and is also a conductor, keyboardist and educator.

It's Miller Time for a Mitzvah Looking for Potential Kidney Donors

Acheinu kol beyt Yisrael begins a prayer dating back to 9th Century C.E. in Babylon that means, in effect, “We are all one family.” It is a central aspect of Judaism that we look out for each other. The Talmud states, “Whoever saves one life, has saved an entire world.” (Sanhedrin 4:5) And the Torah says, “Do not stand idly by while a neighbor bleeds.” (Leviticus 19:16) One of our family members, Andrea Miller, needs a kidney transplant to maintain a healthy life.

Andrea and her husband, Mike, have been valuable members of Temple Beth Torah since they first joined, over 15 years ago, shortly before their son, Manny, came into their lives. Both have served on the board and Mike is the current president. Andrea has served as treasurer, ritual chair and coordinates our security, cleaning services and bills payable. Both Mike and Andrea are volunteer teachers in Sunday School, and their boys, Manny and Levi, willingly help out whenever needed.

The efforts to find a kidney for Andrea are being coordinated by Renewal, a non-profit organization dedicated to saving lives by helping kidney donors and kidney recipients navigate all aspects of the transplant process. Testing is easy; finding the perfect match is not. There is complete anonymity with any questions. The staff at Renewal can answer any questions about the safety of being a kidney donor. Passing this information along to anyone you know will help spread the word and help Renewal have a list of potential matches for Andrea and other patients in need. Yahrtzeit Memorial Plaques

It usually takes at least a month for a plaque to be engraved and sent back to the temple, but in the summer months, it can take longer because many synagogues are purchasing plaques to be ready for High Holidays. Torah Portions for February 2026

Summarized by Rabbi Dan Gordon

February 6-7, 2026 Yitro Exodus 18:1-20:23

Yitro, the portion named for Moses' father-in-law, begins with the Midianite priest's stunning confession that "the Lord is greater than all gods." Wise Jethro sees that Moses is taking too much on his own shoulders, and counsels his son-in-law to delegate his authority. The Ten Commandments are given by God in *Yitro*, amidst thunder and lightning, through Moses' voice. These commandments begin our relationship as a people with a special covenant with God that includes special responsibilities. They are not referred to as "Ten Commandments" at this point, and later called in Hebrew "Aseret Dibrot," or "Ten Words/Utterances." How the ten are divided differs between Judaism and Christianity, as well as within some Christian denominations.

February 13-14, 2026 Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18

"*Mishpatim*" means "rules," "laws" or "ordinances," and seems disorganized to the modern reader because the rules were meant to be remembered through hearing rather than reading. Both ritual and ethical laws are given in *Mishpatim*. Some of the most important laws concern ethical treatment for strangers, widows, and orphans. The first laws given after the Ten Commandments include the treatment of slaves. While we were not forbidden to have slaves, we were commanded to treat them in a certain manner, which included offering freedom after seven years. It is a valuable lesson to remember, since we had just come out of slavery. Sometimes, we are expected to do the opposite of the examples of what we've observed from our experiences. In this case, we're expected to treat servants how we would have liked to have been treated, rather than how we *were* treated.

February 20-21, 2026 Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19

We receive an elaborate description of how the Tabernacle is to be constructed, from the kind of wood used to the fabric for the drapes. Even though the construction is described in very elegant terms, we are encouraged only to make offerings from our hearts. A center piece in the Tabernacle will be the seven-branched menorah, which will be kept lit in an eternal light, signifying God's constant presence.

This Torah portion describes the elaborate procedure involved in ordaining the priestly family, Aaron's descendants, who will be known as "Kohanim." Their clothes and their lives distinguish them as servants of both G-d and the people. They must take their roles extremely seriously, as they represent their sacred rituals will represent the Israelites to G-d. The portion begins with instructions for the "ner tamid" or Eternal Light, that reminds both of G-d's everlasting presence and our eternal relationship and devotion.

GENERAL FUND

Any donation that is not specified to another specific fund goes to the General Fund, which helps maintain the operating budget of the temple. Building expenses, insurance, staff salaries and all program expenses that are not underwritten come out of the General Fund, as well as support for the Religious School.

RABBI'S DISCRETIONARY FUND

This separate tzedakah fund enables the rabbi to make confidential contributions to help individuals and causes that may be in crisis. The rabbi may also use this fund to help support unbudgeted programs that will benefit the temple or community.

BURT LEVY MEMORIAL LIBRARY AND BEAUTIFICATION FUND

This fund maintains the library and helps purchase new books, as well as other cosmetic improvements to the temple's interior. Our library, located in the back of the sanctuary, is named after TBT's founding president, Burt Levy, who was a major inspiration in starting Temple Beth Torah.

TRACY TOBIN JOHNSON MEMORIAL EDUCATION FUND
